Political shifts & legislation that have directly affected the right to a fair trial & access to justice for the accused




"WE NEED TO BE TOUGH ON CRIME TO BE SAFE IN SINGAPORE"

"Many who argued against death penalty put a lot of their focus on people who face the death penalty. Not enough attention is put on their victims. Drug traffickers impose immense penalties, including the death penalty, on their victims. Thousands of people die from drugs and related crimes. We have stopped that in Singapore while countries around the world are losing the war on drugs. We want to protect our people from becoming victims, and to protect our society."

"Hong Kong renounced capital punishment in 1993, and had no executions since [1966]. Yet there were no measurable differences in their homicide rates [compared to Singapore], regardless of whether the execution rate in Singapore was measured for drug offenses or for murder."

The EU holds a principled position against the death penalty and is opposed to the use of capital punishment under any circumstances. The death penalty has not been shown in any way to act as a deterrent to crime. Furthermore, any errors - inevitable in any legal system - are irreversible. The EU will continue in its pursuit of the abolition of the death penalty worldwide.

Homicide Rates in Hong Kong & Singapore




Executions in Singapore (For All Crimes) Compared with the Homicide Rate

- Cannot afford the best representation
- Most rely on State Counsel assigned to them
- Sometimes they are assisted by pro bono lawyers but sometimes too late
- Already in a vulnerable state, tricked into confession
- Death Penalty unsafe in an environment of lack of safeguards

Safeguards **SHOULD NOT** be Undermined

- Abolition of Trial by Jury (1969)
- Removal of the Right of Silence (1976)
- Reduction in the number of judges hearing capital punishment cases, from 3 to 2 to 1
- Saving costs of judicial procedure at the risk of executing the innocent

- Conviction based on confessions alone
- Conviction based on uncorroborated evidence or evidence of an accomplice
- presumptions stacked in favour of prosecutorial decisions due to lack of transparency
- Unanimous decisions vs Majority decisions

Changes to the Mandatory Death Penalty



"With due respect, Mr Speaker, if the definition of "substantively assisted" is to be based on outcome, it seems that only offenders who are "useful" may fall under the court's discretion not to impose the death sentence. **Surely** there are moral and ethical issues that as a society, we should be concerned with here when we have such a utilitarian paradigm of human beings in our judicial system."

The intention was to cause death


